Tomokanga

It's been a long time coming, but we are getting very close to having our tomokanga installed. If you're not sure what a tomokanga is, it is a Māori carved entranceway - often found outside the front of a marae or other important building.

Our tomokanga has been carved by local Rangitāne carver, Craig Kawana, who has carved a number of sculptures across the city. It is hoped that our tomokanga will be installed ready for the first day of term - fingers crossed!

Tuakana/Teina

Tuakana/Teina is all about the relationship between an 'older person' and a 'younger person'. In our school this typically means, a relationship between our seniors and juniors.

As part of their Creativity and Communication learning, Akomanga 2 (the tuakana) designed and painted Aboriginal rocks. They then hid them across the school for Akomanga and 7 and 8 (the teina) to find!
