Winter has really made it's presence known, with a recent spate of icy cold days. Please make sure your tamaiti (child) comes to kura with a jacket and/or jersey to keep themselves warm when they are playing outside. It's also a good idea, especially for our teina (younger children) to pack a spare change of clothes, should they need a change through the day for whatever reason.

Structured Literacy

Many of you will be aware that we are proudly a Structured Literacy school. Over the past 6 years, we have spent a considerable amount of time learning about the best way to teach Reading and Writing, that is based on national and international research. Through a structured literacy approach, we teach in a very specific way, which provides our tamariki with the knowledge and skills they need to learn to read and write and spell. The beginnings of this are learning the first 8 sounds and letters - m, s, f, a, p, t, c, i. Our tamariki learn the sounds of these letters, so that when they see the letters together, such as s-a-t, they can read the word by sounding out the letters. No more guessing, looking at pictures and wondering what the word might be - they can sound the letters to read. This forms the foundation of their literacy learning. We teach this approach in both English (Kura Auraki) and Te Reo Māori (Te Arawaru).

This photo proudly shows one of our new entrant tamariki, Matthew, who has learned the first 8 sounds, which he can use to read and write! Ka mau te wehi Matthew!

Over the past 6 months, we (and other businesses and PNBHS) have had ongoing korero with the Palmerston North City Council, as they have been consulting on the re-design of Featherston Street. In particular, the installation of cycle lanes. As a kura and School Board, we were opposed to the cycle lanes as very few of our tamariki bike along Featherston Street (as it is far too dangerous) and it would mean the loss of carparks for our whānau outside our kura.

Recently PNCC announced that they are proceeding with the installation of two cycle lanes on Featherston Street - one on either side of the street.
