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Looking back on our history...

This photo is of Mr. Robert North Keeling who was the first Headmaster of Central School, located on the corner of Main and Princess Streets.

Mr Keeling was a teacher at Marton School, when he was informed by the Wellington Education Board that he was to be the teacher and headmaster at Central.

On the 22 March 1873, the 'Gazette' of the Wellington Provincial Government notified the public that the Palmerston North School had been officially established and was open "without fee or payment, to all children not under the age of 5 years, nor above the age of 15 years."

This was the start of Central Normal School.
